Adam Hurt is a remarkable old-time banjo player who has won or placed at countless banjo competitions including this year at Clifftop. He has also won several state fiddle championships. Adam began playing clawhammer banjo in 1995, an instrument he discovered in an elementary-school classroom in Saint Paul, Minnesota, thanks to a homeroom teacher who was actively involved with the Twin Cities' folk music scene. Following a brief obsession with the bluegrass mandolin, Adam quickly decided to fully concentrate his musical efforts on old-time music in general and the banjo and all that it could do in particular. 

# **HILLY KRISTAL 1932-2007**

It is with great sadness that I learned about the passing of Hilly Kristal. He died on August 28th at the age of 75. The cause of death was lung cancer.

A former singer and songwriter, Hilly later became the manager of the Village Vanguard, the world famous jazz club in New York's Greenwich Village. In 1973, he started his own club on the Bowery at the foot of Bleecker Street in the East Village. Originally, he envisioned it would feature country, blue grass, and blues, so he called the place CBGB, the initials of those genres. Many people know that CBGB, later called CBGB/Omfug, soon became the epicenter of the New Wave explosion. Among the artists who got their first big break at CBGB/Omfug were the Ramones, Patti Smith, Blondie, and the Talking Heads.

Fewer people, however, realize that Hilly also operated another club, CB's 313 Gallery, which continued to feature acoustic music, including folk music of various kinds. It was located right next door to CBGB/Omfug, and over the years it presented many members of the New York Pinewoods Folk Music Club, especially in its Woody Guthrie Birthday Bash and its Midwinter Hoot, both of which I had the honor of producing. Among those club members were Jane Babits, Toby Fagenson, Jessica Feinbloom, Richard Fried, David Kleiman, Joel Landy, Mark Maniak, Anne Price, Erica Smith, Carlos Vazquez, and Frank Woerner, as well as yours truly. Please forgive me if I left anyone out.



Beyond being a club owner, Hilly Kristal was a mensch.

Yes, he made a decent living from his clubs, but he never became fantastically wealthy from them. Maybe it's because he treated both the artists and the audiences decently. For the audiences, cover charges were kept low, drinks were reasonably priced, and no one was forced to make a minimum purchase. For the artists, they got to keep 85 or 90 percent of the gate after the house took a small amount off the top, usually \$25 or \$50, to pay the sound person. That's a better split than most commercial venues offer.

CBGB/Omfug and CB's 313 Gallery closed in 2006 after Hilly's lease expired and the landlord reclaimed the space. New York City and the world are both poorer for their absence. Now they are poorer yet for the loss of Hilly Kristal. May he rest in peace.
